SAVE BLUE v. UNION OF SINDIA

- The Union of Sindia is the second largest populated country in the world, having gained independence in the last century, the growth of the nation is marvelous enough, being the second largest growing economy and the youngest nation in the world. Sindia is a prime member of SAARC and several other world forums playing a major role in world arena. 17 Sustainable Development Goals were adopted in 2015 and thereby in collaboration with the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) 3 projects were implemented since 2015.
- Recently Sindia hosted the World Sustainable Development Summit in April 2019 wherein the parties agreed to move towards Renewable source of energy and rural development as its top aim. It is also the most anticipating member of reforms in United Nations Security Council (UNSC). In April 2018, International Renewable Energy Agency (IRENA) held a conference in March 2019 under the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), the conference passed a resolution wherein the countries including Sindia agreed to increase renewable source of energy by 2% annually in nations total energy source.
- Despite of all this Sindia had issues internally as any other developing country with the recent problem being excessive energy shortage especially in southern and eastern States wherein development and investments are more. With most literate people, energy and balanced development became a matter of right determining even the victory in elections. With respect to neighbors also the relationships are up and down. Moreover the neighboring state Swarnabhumi signed an agreement with Mandarina, the North east neighbour of Sindia, leasing a port island Mannar, the closest Island to Sindia of Swarnabhumi which is alleged to be Military camp.
- Sindia has a total coastline of 7300 km approximately, out of which mainland coastline consists of 6100 km and islands' coastline consists of 1197 km. Sindian coastline touches nine states and four union territories. Aram State in North has the longest sea coastline in India of 1,600 km wherein one Ocean power project was launched under Sustainable Development Goals (SDG). Large parts of the coastal plains of Sindia are covered by fertile soils. Fishing is an important occupation of the people living in the coastal areas of India and the coastal area also marks the habitat of tribal community engaged in fishing. The coastal belt comprises of a wide range of ecosystems extending from sandy beaches and mangroves to coral reefs and rocky shores. Mangroves make 6% of the coastal area in Sindia.
- The coastal line is the home to rare species of flora and fauna. Around one fifth of the population of the country lives along the coastal region and there are 3 metropolitan cities of the country in coastal region. The coastal region makes Sindia one of the preferred destination for Beach tourism. Tourism marks almost 9% approximately of the nations GDP. Sindian coastal region is of great importance as it shares coastal border with nations in South Asia like Swarnabhumi, Mayadives etc. The coastal region is the heart of economy as Sindia's trade importance is largely due to its coastal location.
- Hamantha is a small group of islands located in the Bay of Engal in the east of Sindia, the group of Island is a union territory. The island comprises of 8 islands with South Hamantha

being the capital island (ANNEXURE). The island has one of the largest coral reefs in the country. The Union Territory shares a maritime border with the nation Swarnabhumi. The island has one Member of Parliament in Lok Sabha and one Member of Parliament in Rajya Sabha with Lieutenant Governor being the Chief Administrator. The tourism industry of Hamantha has the largest tourism potential in Sindia with its distant from Sindia meaning a great hindrance to that. Tourism in Hamantha is promoted by Sindian Tourism Ministry (STM), a government of Sindia undertaking. The island is often a matter of concern due to illegal migration and unstable neighbours and natural hazards, the 2004 tsunami being the major.

- The island has a population of 4 lakhs as per 2011 and is home to 6 indigenous tribes in the world which makes 2000 in population. The Sakura Island, the smallest of all is the home of Saakuria tribe one of the most indigenous in the world with no outside world touch and the island is a Prohibited Area. The Hamantha island population has increased from 2.5 lakhs in 2001 to 4 lakhs in 2011 wherein the tribal population decreased from 2500 to 2000. The islander's primary occupation is tourism and fishing with little agriculture. The island is backward in terms of communication and internet facility but an emerald in itself being home to several rare and beautiful species. Excessive power cuts and remoteness are challenges. The middle and north is the coral hub with corals in south of slightly less density.
- Since 2015, Power shortage is a major trouble and cause of dissatisfaction of people. The connectivity was enhanced from 4 major cities through Air and Sea. The island since 2015 received a lot of tourist which is 30% more than usual. In recent times the local people claimed excessive crocodile movements in the human habitation areas and the local people state that this happened never before. On 2nd April 2018, American tourist were attacked and killed by crocodile and since then the government took several actions wherein the beaches were prohibited for swimmers and the government issued an order restricting fishing in areas for local fishing communities. Since 2010 the island witnessed large number of plastic deposit and several aquatic creatures were found dead in the sea shore in recent times with 1 Dugong each month since 2016.
- In 2018 Parliamentary election, the National Democratic Party came to power in the centre and also in the island. Many developments have been brought up like Optic Fibre Connection Cable under Connect Sindia Project to enhance speed of internet being the major project. Efforts are made to enhance tourism and education with 4 colleges being inaugurated since 2015.
- Since the area is a coastal zone, changes to Coastal Regulation Zone (CRZ) were anticipated and after all procedures the CRZ 2019 duly came into effect in January 2019. The Union of Sindia made a Press Release as to the aim and purpose of CRZ 2019 as given under "the Central Government, with a view to conserve and protect the unique environment of coastal stretches and marine areas, besides livelihood security to the fisher communities and other local communities in the coastal areas and to promote sustainable development based on scientific principles taking into account the dangers of natural hazards, sea level rise due to global warming"

The following provisions were made pertaining to Hamantha Islands

Regulation

2.5 -CRZ V-The Hamantha group of islands shall exclusively come under CRZ V from the date of the 18th January 2019.

The limit of CRZ in the Zone V shall be 50 metres from the High Tide Line.

5.4.1 - The restrictions and prohibition applied to CRZ I under the CRZ 2019 shall apply to the CRZ V.

Provided that nothing contained in any law, rule and the CRZ regulation 2019 shall affect the exclusive power of Union of Sindia to limit or impose Prohibition and Regulation to the said CRZ V including power to modify the CRZ limit and No development Zone limit except for island in ecologically sensitive zones i.e. Sakura Island in advancement of development and public interest of the Nation.

Provided all provision in any law contrary to this regulation shall remain inoperative till the regulation is in operation to the extend needed to accomplish the purpose of the regulation. Any such laws shall be operative only when the Government of Sindia specifically permits expressly through order the operation of such laws.

As per the above law several developments took place.

In October 2019 the government launched a huge ocean power project in Sabath Island wherein 10 coastal villages were to be taken up and given rehabilitation including the two villages of native tribes whose primary occupation is fishing. Under the ocean power plant sea turbines generate powers, the acquisitions have started and the project is in initial stage. The government of Sindia in November 2019 launched Emerald island project wherein the Central Government declared 2 islands namely Gala and Hatten Island's No development Zone as 10 metre Limit from HTL and bidding were invited for setting resort in the islands. The government also sanctioned a huge bridge to connect the Tara island one of the entry restricted island (due to its rare flora and fauna) and the closest to Mannar Island with the main island via sea wherein a three kilometre bridge is proposed. The Government exercised the power under CRZ provisions pertaining to Hamantha Island.

On January 2020 the students association of Hamantha college made a protest in front of Raj Bhavan the resident of Lieutenant Governor and within 3 days the protest grew into a Public movement wherein lot of people joined the protest in the Capital city Hamana. After that agitation started in the Union of Sindia often leading to violence especially in the island of Hamantha which is inhabited by students largely and people who are native before 2000 who are likely to get affected the most. The agitations were done stating the Regulation as “Coast Curtailment Regulation”. Slogans were shouted calling the CRZ regulation as a suppression of Islanders interest rather than facilitating.

SAVE BLUE is an organisation exclusively devoted to research and other works to develop marine ecosystem. It is committed to Coastal protection and wildlife which opposed the CRZ

for the island whereas the Tourism Agency Association welcomed the Project. Uprising and protest rose in Hamana asking for revival of status to CRZ I and stating present provision as threat to life of local people, tribes, flora and fauna were widespread. With the initiation of ocean power project demanding displacement of people the SAVE BLUE organization having top native people and former Member of Parliament including Mr. Saarkar of opposition party Union People Party (UPP) as members filed a PIL in the Supreme Court questioning the validity of the special regulations **2.5 & 5.4.1** of the CRZ 2019.

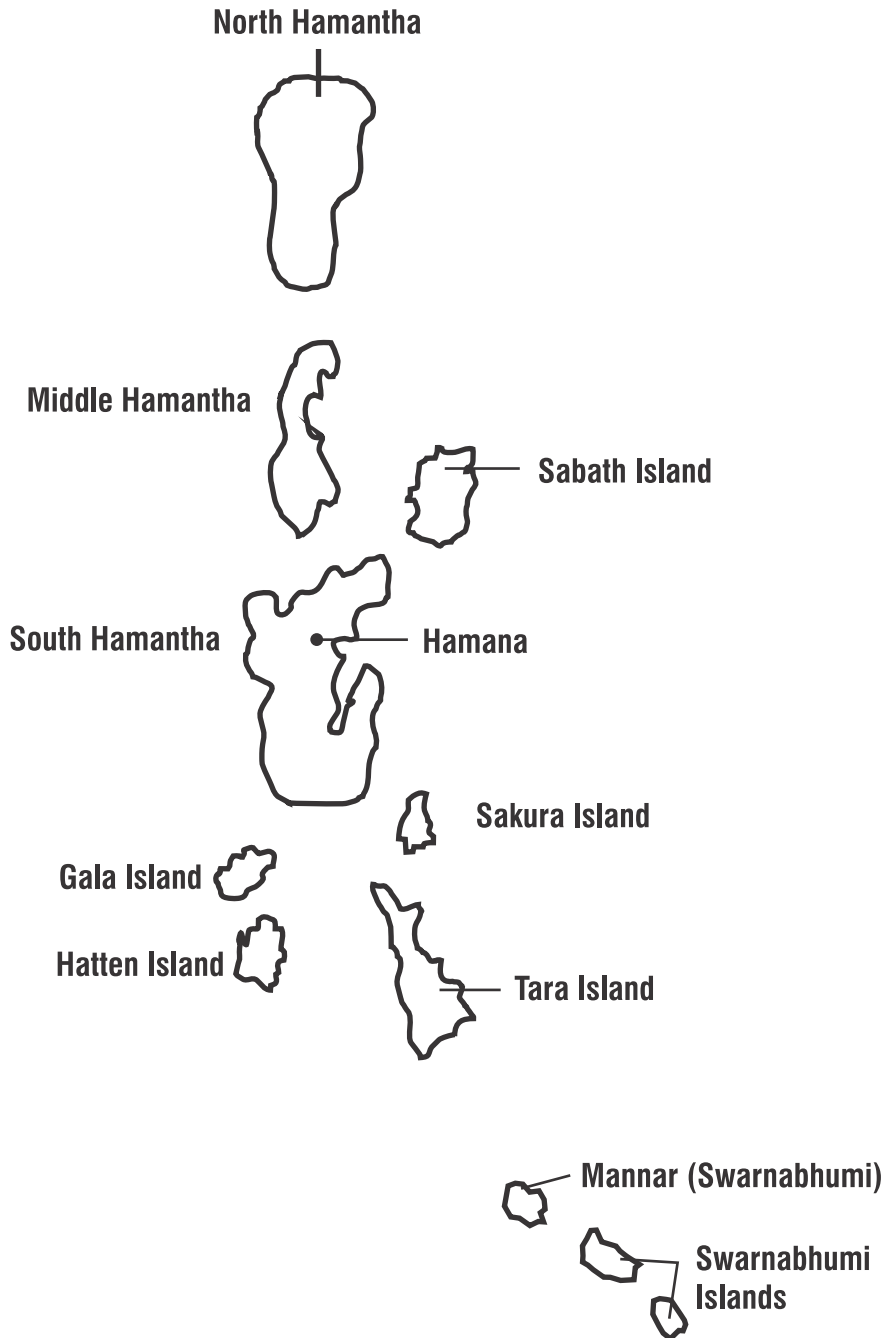
The case is filed against the Union of Sindia alleging the special provisions of CRZ as discriminatory and prejudiced to the interest of its indigenous tribal people, environment especially the exclusive flora and fauna and citizens for the sake of development and tourism, where as the Ministry of Environment and Forest of Union of Sindia gave a press release stating that aim of the special provision of CRZ is merely to boost development and connectivity with the islands on par with environment laws.

The case is posted for argument before the Honorable Supreme Court of Sindia.

1. Whether the PIL filed by “Save Blue” seeking interference of Supreme Court is maintainable?
2. Whether the project under CRZ affects the environment endangering ecosystem?
3. Whether the CRZ is contrary to the native tribal peoples right to livelihood?
4. Whether the CRZ giving excessive discretion to the Union of Sindia is ultra vires of the parent law and the Constitution?

Note: The laws of Sindia are in pari materia with laws of India.

MOOT COURT RULES AND REGULATION

AIM AND PURPOSE

- a. Prof. R.V.Dhanapalan National Law Moot has been conceived with the aim of creating opportunities for learning and development of jurisprudence on emerging trends to develop cutting edge skills in research, drafting and advocacy.
- b. It is aimed to facilitate the evolution of the jurisprudential analysis of the laws and consequential emergence of new laws.

I. VENUE AND DATE

27th –29th March 2020

The Central Law College,
Yercaud Main Road, Kannankurichi,
Salem, Tamil Nadu- 636008.

II. LANGUAGE

The competition proceedings shall be in English only.

III. ELIGIBILITY

Participation is restricted to bona fide undergraduate students of 5 years/ 3 years LL.B. programme of any University/Institution /College (recognised by the Bar Council of India).

IV. TEAM COMPOSITION

Each Institution participating in the competition shall send a team consisting of two Speakers and one Researcher. In any case, the team shall not consist of more than 3 participants. The travelling expenses shall be borne by their respective home Institution.

Each team will have a team code and each participant will be given an individual code. Team shall not disclose their identity or that of their institution or city etc. Such disclosures will invite penalties including disqualification. The decision in this regard shall be at the discretion of the Moot Committee of the host Institution.

V. DRESS CODE:

- For Boys-Black Pants, white shirt with Black Blazer and Black Tie.
- For Girls- Black Pants, white shirt with Black Blazer or white churidar suits with black blazer or white sari with white blouse and black blazer.

VI. REGISTRATION

- The Registration shall be restricted to **20 teams on first come first serve basis.**
- Only one team is allowed from each participating institution.
- Filled in scanned copy of Registration form and the scanned copy of D.D. shall be sent by email to the email ID: elcnationalmoot2019@gmail.com on or before 25.02.2020. A confirmation e-mail will be sent to the participating institutions sending the provisional registration mails.
- Registration fee is Rs. 3000/- for each participating team, payable by way of DD drawn in favor of **The Principal (Expenses), The Central Law College, Salem.**
- Accommodation, local conveyance and hospitality for participants will be provided as specified in the rules.
- The participating team must submit the hard copy of Registration Form along with DD, institution's approval letter and travel form on or before 29th February 2020.
- The Registration Form should be sent by post to THE PRINCIPAL, THE CENTRAL LAW COLLEGE, Yercaud Main Road, Kannankurichi (Po), Salem, Tamil Nadu – 636 008. The confirmation mail will be sent on receipt of the hard copy of the Registration Form.
- After Registration, any request for change of name/ participants will not be entertained except at the sole discretion of the Moot Committee of the Host Institution.

VII. ORIENTATION

There will be an Orientation on rules and regulations for all the participants on 27th March 2020 followed by a draw of lots. Team codes and side will be allotted during the orientation. The fixtures will be decided therein.

A. ROUNDS

1. The Competition shall consist of two Preliminary Rounds, a Quarter-Final Round, a Semi-Final Round and a Final Round. The top 8 teams from the preliminary rounds shall qualify to participate in the Quarter-Finals. Winners of the Quarter-Finals will proceed to Semi-Finals. Winners in the Semi-finals will qualify for the Final Round.
2. The team shall argue cases against each other. For the said purpose, fixture of team will be decided by draw of lots prior to the commencement of the competition i.e. on 27th March 2020 at The Central Law College Salem.

B. PRELIMINARY ROUND

1. There will be two preliminary rounds of arguments per team, one as Petitioner and Respondent.
2. No team will face each other for more than once in the preliminary rounds.
3. Preliminary Rounds will be held on 28th March 2020.

4. The Top 8 teams from the Preliminary Rounds will advance to the Quarter-Final round. The basis of selection will be decided as follows:
 - i. Win in both prelims with aggregate points in both rounds
 - ii. One Win + Aggregate raw points in both rounds,
 - iii. Team with maximum Aggregate raw points in both rounds
 - iv. Team with maximum Aggregate marks– Memorial marks (in case of tie)
 - the criteria (ii) will be applied only when teams for quarter final could not be shortlisted as per criteria (i) in addition to team qualified under criteria (i)
 - the criteria (iii) will be applied when required teams for quarter-final could not be obtained under criteria (i) and (ii) respectively, in addition to team qualified under criteria (i) and (ii)
 - the criteria (iv) will be applied when required teams for quarter-final could not be obtained under criteria (i), (ii) & (iii) respectively, in addition to team qualified under criteria (i), (ii) and (iii).
5. Memorial marks will be added to the scores of all the rounds.

C. QUARTER-FINAL ROUND:

6. During the Quarter-Final round, the team will be required to argue either on behalf of the Petitioner or the Respondent. The teams to argue on a particular side will be decided by a draw of lots prior to the commencement of the Quarter-Final round.
7. In the Quarter-Final Round, each team will be allowed 25 minutes to argue. The division of time between the two speakers is left to the discretion of the team. In addition to the 25 minutes time allotted for arguments, 2 minutes will be provided for Rebuttals and 2 minutes will also be given to the opposite team for Sur-Rebuttal.

The Quarter-Final round will be a knockout round with a win enabling a team to get into the Semi-Finals. Memorial scores will be added to the oral scores for this round where in the total scores will be 100 marks.

D. SEMI-FINAL ROUND:

8. During the Semi-Final round, the team will be required to argue either on behalf of the Petitioner or the Respondent. The teams to argue on a particular side will be decided by a draw of lots prior to the commencement of the Semi-Final round.
9. In the Semi-Final Round, each team will be allowed 30 minutes to argue. The division of time between the two speakers is left to the discretion of the team. In addition to the 30 minutes time allotted for arguments, 2 minutes will be provided for Rebuttals and 2 minutes will also be given to the opposite team for Sur-Rebuttal.
10. The Semi-Final round will be a knockout round with a win enabling a team to get into the Finals. Memorial scores will be added to the oral scores for this round.

E. FINAL ROUND:

11. During the Final round, the team will be required to argue either on behalf of the Petitioner or the Respondents. The teams to argue on a particular side will be decided by a draw of lots prior to the commencement of the Final Round.
 - a. In the Final Round, each team will be allowed 40 minutes to argue. The division of time between the two speakers is left to the discretion of the team. In addition to the 40 minutes time allotted for arguments, 5 minutes will be provided for Rebuttals and 5 minutes will also be given to the opposite team for Sur-Rebuttal.
 - b. The winner of the Final Round will be declared as the winner of this Moot Court Competition. Memorial scores will be added to the oral scores for this round.
 - c. Participating team will be required to strictly follow the time limits for all the rounds.

VIII. RESULTS

Results of the preliminary rounds will be announced after the completion of preliminary rounds of all the teams. Similarly, the results of the Quarter-Final/Semi-Final Round will be announced after completion of the rounds. The result of the Final Round will be announced in the Valedictory Ceremony. Attendance of all participants are mandatory on all three days including valedictory.

IX. MEMORIALS

IX-A-Memorials/ Written submissions:

1. All the teams are required to submit Memorials/Written submissions for both the petitioner and the respondent.
2. One advance hard copy of memorials (both Petitioner and Respondent) along with the Soft Copy of the memorials from both the sides in word format (*.doc or *.docx) in a CD must reach the host institution (address of our college) for evaluation on or before 14th March 2020 before 3.00 p.m. No excuses in respect of delayed post services will be entertained. The memorials should be sent to the following postal address through speed post only:

3. Late submission of soft copy or hard copy or both of the Memorials will be penalized by 2 point for each day.
4. Each team shall submit 5(five) hard copies of memorials, each for the Petitioner and Respondent. Names of the participants or their institutions or any kind of identification mark should not appear on any part of the Memorials.
5. Five copies of the memorials shall be submitted during the desk registration at 3.30 pm on 27th March 2020 at THE CENTRAL LAW COLLEGE, SALEM, TAMIL NADU. A covering letter must be enclosed with the memorial (hard copy) specifying the name of the college/university of the participating team.

6. Participants are advised to carry extra copies of their Memorials for their own use. The copies submitted to the organizing committee would be for the purpose of evaluation of memorial and for the use of judges of the competition and will not be returned to the participants.
7. After the completion of the competition, the organizers shall reserve the right to use the memorials submitted by the participating teams, as they may deem appropriate.
- i) The memorials should not exceed 25 typed pages (excluding front and back cover page)
- ii) The font and size of the text of all part of the memorial must be in Times New Roman of 12 point. Footnotes must be in font size of 10.
- iii) The memorial must contain the following.

Cover Page for Petitioner - Blue Color
Cover Page for Respondent - Red Color

The top right corner of the cover page of the memorials must contain space for writing the respective team code that will be assigned to the team

- a. Table of Contents
- b. Table of Authorities
- c. Statement of Jurisdiction
- d. Statement of Facts
- e. Statement of Issues
- f. Summary of Arguments
- g. Written Pleading
- h. Prayers

** Binding specification - Spiral binding only.

IX - B - Evaluation:

- a) Each Memorial will be evaluated for 10 marks (for each side) and the Team memorial marks will be the memorial mark of the petitioner/respondent as per their position in the case..
- b) Memorials will be adjudged by a special panel of Judges.

The following will be the Evaluating Criteria and the marks will be allocated to each category as under.

X. AWARDS AND PRIZES:

Awards and cash prizes for the Moot Court Competition are as follows:

1. Winners of the Moot Court Competition will be awarded with a Winner's Trophy, mementos for team members and a Certificate of Merit.
2. The Runners-up team will be awarded with a Trophy, mementos for team members and a Certificate of Merit.
3. The Best Student Advocate Male will be awarded a Trophy and a Certificate of Merit.
4. The Best Student Advocate Female will be awarded a Trophy and a Certificate of Merit.
5. The Best Memorial Award (highest aggregate marks of both memorial), the Researcher will be awarded with a Trophy and a Certificate of Merit.
6. Each participant in the Moot Court Competition will be awarded a Certificate of Participation.

Participants shall attend on all days mandatorily from registration to valedictory in formals. Prizes and certificate shall be issued only in Valedictory and to the concerned participant only, therefore attendance is mandatory. Host institution shall not be responsible for their Certificates in case of absence.

XI. SCOUTING:

1. Teams will not be allowed to observe the oral argument of other teams. Scouting is strictly prohibited.
2. The Researcher shall sit with speakers of his/her team at the time of oral arguments and shall not attend the court session of any other team.

Further, the participants are strictly prohibited from contacting the framer of the moot proposition. Any attempt to do so will result in an immediate disqualification of the entire team.

XII. HOSPITALITY:

1. Accommodation will be provided to the members of the team, restricted up to three only, from 12:00 pm on 27th March, 2020 up to 12.00 p.m on 30th March 2020.
2. Food and other facilities will be provided to the members of the team. Food will be provided from the dinner on 27th March, 2020 up to the lunch on 29th March, 2020.
3. Local Conveyance (transport between the accommodation and the Competition venue) to the participating teams will be provided by the host institution.
4. On 27th March 2020 pick up on arrival arrangements will be made available only on prior request by the participants.

The Teams are required to report on 27th March, 2020 at 3:00 pm at THE CENTRAL LAW COLLEGE, SALEM for orientation and Desk Registration during which Team codes will be given and Fixtures will be made (by lot). Participants must submit their memorials (5 sets) at the time of desk registration.

XIII. FINALITY OF DECISION

The decision of the judges shall be final and binding.
